FHJ Black History Bowl Celebrates African-American Ancestry & Culture

"Who was the founder of the Equal Justice Initiative?" "Who said, 'In a racist society, it is not enough to be non-racist. We must be anti-racist." Questions such as these came flying, as Elder Dana Edmond, moderator, worked masterfully to keep up with the participants as they rang in their answers with lightning speed. The Black History Bowl is a quiz-show styled event where scholars answer a variety of questions about key figures and events in Black history. The 2nd Annual Black History Bowl was an event to remember. From the nail-biting Junior Division (3rd - 5th grades) competition, to the invigorating Senior Division (6th - 8th grades) game, everyone was on the edge of their seats.

On February 23rd, a public school, private school and charter school all

came together for one groundbreaking event. In the Junior Division, FHJ Prep played Purpose Prep Charter School, and represented in the Senior Division were Jere Baxter Middle School and FHJ Prep. Each school had students participate in a qualifying exam to see who would represent their school at the Black History Bowl. Each team consisted of four team members and an alternate.

On the night of the event, the teams participated in a 3-round game. The team with the most points after three rounds was declared the winner. Purpose Prep pushed through and won the Junior Division, as FHJ Prep soared to victory in the Senior Division. The winners on each team each received \$100, with the alternate receiving \$75.

STEAM Week of Prayer Unites Science and the Word

n April our scholars learned more about their Creator as we explored connections between Science and the Word.

Day 1: Scholars learned about compression and tension. We learned that no matter how much weight one strand of spaghetti can hold, multiple strands are stronger when combined.
